

## Income Levels to Qualify for Assistance in NC

Family Size	Medicaid Up to 42% FPL	Marketplace Subsidy Starting at 100% FPL
 One	<b>Coverage Gap</b> No Assistance	Starting at <b>\$13,590</b> per year
 Two	Up to <b>\$6,828</b> per year	<b>Coverage Gap</b> No Assistance
 Three	Up to <b>\$8,004</b> per year	Starting at <b>\$23,030</b> per year
 Four	Up to <b>\$8,928</b> per year	Starting at <b>\$27,750</b> per year

### How a Parent Falls in the Coverage Gap

**Family Size:** Two (Single mother with one child)

**Hourly Pay:** \$7.25 (minimum wage) full-time (40 hours/week)


**Earnings:** \$1,160/month, \$13,920/year

**Assistance:** No Assistance, COVERAGE GAP



**76% of adults in the coverage gap are employed.**

Among adults with Medicaid who aren't working, the majority report barriers to work, including:

- Caregiving obligations
- Illness or disability
- School attendance
